





Kansas Hereford Association News:

2023 is in the rear view mirror and 2024 is upon us. So what do you think? Optimistic? Who can tell. Seems like we are always talking about the "world" going crazy and how many different things can weigh on what we all do. Panic about this and panic about that and first thing you know it's all about panic! If you go according to the numbers, the cattle market should be pretty darn good...and for the most part it is. Cattle prices are way better than a couple of years ago for sure, grains not so much. Just seems like we spend it at a much faster rate is all, so relatively speaking we're getting by and thankful for it. When I look around the corner and when I watch the news I feel real good about "getting by". And blessed to be able to do what I do and "get by". Since most of what I see doesn't make a lot of sense, I guess I'll repeat what I said a year ago. Sit back and see what happens. Do what I can with what I have, and keep plenty of duct tape and baling wire around to patch it up.

Sales have been pretty good this fall considering the dry weather. Prices for breeding cattle have been strong in most areas, especially where there has been some moisture and feed grown. I think that may straighten out after the first of the year when the "funds" get their year end stuff done. Personally, we did send some to the Hereford Feedout because the pencil works, maybe, and we always need to be able to have an honest comparison between ourselves and the rest of the breed and the industry. The Hereford discount is back in a big way, and if we are going to trust and prove the worth of our cattle and the breed as a whole, the only way may be in the finished product. We are also intending to feed some at home for Greater Omaha. That should also be interesting as a comparison. I encourage everyone to try your best to find a way to enhance the value of your cattle. The discounts are not just on Herefords as many smaller lots are also being discounted in the market place. With these good base prices in the industry right now, it may be a good time to try something different than just hauling them to the sale barn.

The weather has been pretty good this fall and most of the harvesting went good. Crops were all over the place for yields, from good to lousy. Mostly ours were lousy! Insurance is good. Hay is short, but may get by if it don't snow too much. A lot of rough stuff baled in our country. Water is getting to be quite an issue all around the state as stock ponds and wells dry up. Springs in our part of the state that have never quit are going dormant. That's not all that uncommon except that they usually come back in the winter. Not so this time. I told a fella one day that I am getting old enough now that when I see something I ain't never seen before it may mean something. Some of these drought things are like that. The drought is still persisting, but we did catch some moisture and are hopeful that is a trend, except of course we don't need a bunch of snow, you know the hay thing, but then again if we don't get snow or rain, no grass. Oh yea, I said I wasn't going to panic! Just wait and see, right? Stop bellyaching! OK. And if it does rain, what are these cattle prices going to do then? Should be a fun and exciting year to live through in 2024. Wow this is fun.

A good group showed up to do the business of the association and visit about all the stuff mentioned above and a lot more. What a treat to get together and stuff ourselves, do a little business and get caught up. Our board is looking into many different ways of promoting the breed and we shall see how it goes. 





Gene Editing

No doubt some of you have heard about the recent attempt to allow gene editing in our Assn to take place for the horn/polled trait. I have also heard the Angus and Red Angus boards are being confronted with making a decision on allowing gene editing also but on other traits. I must commend our board for heeding the canaries in the coal mine and voting no at this time on this issue. Why? Simply put for two major reasons.... unintended consequences and a completely unlevel playing field if incorporated. Unintended consensus..... Holstein allowed the horned polled trait to be incorporated using standardized and approved methods. While it worked to genetically dehorn them thru the gene editing process, they were blindsided by the incorporation of bacterial DNA causing antibiotic resistance. As far as the playing field, the cost of incorporating gene editing into a program is such that it is out of question for all but very small number of the absolutely most well healed of outfits, the AI studs and the genomic companies like Neogen. While the panel on gene editing at the annual meeting refused to answer any questions related to the cost of doing gene editing, a simple search on Google yielded anywhere from 175-250K per calf and that for the most part those embryos were cloned with that bill as well to play this game. Finally, you have to ask yourself, why is there a push for gene editing given the moral and ethical issues that many have brought up in the last several months and why should we be adding another level of genetic complication to be incorporated into our genomic system that many including myself currently feel is hugely inaccurate and problematic at best.

Delayed Blindness Defect

I must commend the Assn.'s changes to our online registry to reflect any potential carriers in a pedigree when a defect is found. It was put in place coming out of maple syrup and has proven that it works exceedingly well in notifying breeders in a very timely fashion of defect issues they may have in their programs. However, its use during the release of DB was problematic. As it turns out, several older major sires who traced back to the ground zero individual (and who turned out to be hot as well) and are found in the pedigrees of a tremendous number of cattle in this breed today were delayed for some reason in being tested as well as progeny of theirs who were also widely used at the time of its release to the membership. This created a huge number of cattle initially listed as potential carriers that after a couple of weeks were then cleared as those major sires had been tested. For those who had or have fall sales this was a real issue. The Assn has the power and the authority to test any individual that has a DNA profile on file for defects at any time they wish. I strongly encourage the Board to do away with the "gentleman"s agreement" of asking the owners of major sires for permission to run them and instead notify them they are going to being run and don't release things till they have been. It would have eliminated a lot of unnecessary heartburn this go-round. As to how many progeny a sire must have to be mandatorily run, that needs looked at to decide for sure, but given the 3 main carriers that had the most impact having sired numerous AI sires and herd bulls, and that next generation of bulls doing the same, it many need to be as low as 100 progeny.

The Elephant in the Room

As much as I hate to say this though, none of what I have mentioned above really matters in the grand scheme of things. They amount little more than a couple snowflakes in a blizzard. Anyone who watches Superior or sells straight Hereford calves in the sale barn knows exactly what I'm talking about....\$20-30 cwt discounts on straight Hereford feeder calves and Hereford influence red baldies. You can talk all you want about the things Hereford does better than the other breeds, you can talk all day long it takes a Hereford to make a black baldie, but none of it matters when these discounts happen every day where the overwhelming majority of calves are marketed and how this discount consequently determines a vast number of those operation's breed utilization decisions. Furthermore, how many of that commercial operation's baldie cows are going to see a Hereford bull now or in the future knowing a portion of those cows, if bred back Hereford, will have red white faced calves that are going to be worth \$200-300 less than their black hided counterparts? Those of us around in '97 for that meeting with Hop and Craig at Denver in the Marriot hotel meeting room after the carload show remember why CHB was created. To add value and end the discounts on straight Hereford steers. It wasn't to sell black baldies. Anyone with a lick of cow savvy knows black baldies always have and always will sell themselves for steady or better money. CHB did what it set out to do, the discounts on straight Hereford feeder calves either disappeared or were substantially reduced depending on the part of the country. However some folks in charge forgot that and wanted to go toe to toe with Angus on quality grade and changed CHB specs to essentially mimic CAB specs. Now that that's been done look what's happened to the straight Hereford steer, he's been by and large replaced in CHB with a black baldie and rightfully so considering you have to marble like Angus in our very own branded beef program. While the average Hereford steer generally can go (actually needs to go, the days of select are over) at least low choice, he'll will never hit the equivalent to CAB specs. Additionally, combine that with since those spec changes occurred, our volume of CHB tonnage has fallen like Bud Lights market share. Have you noticed how the annual CHB report used to be given by the number of head going thru but now its lbs. of product? It looks ok to those that don't have much of a background in the meat side of this business, but its smoke and mirrors. If you give the program the benefit of the doubt and say they are only moving the primals (no hamburger, roasts ect) you have roughly 150lbs of product per steer. Grab your old Hereford Journals and a calculator and do the math. Even when you add in Greater Omaha's kill, we've lost the critical mass of demand we fought so hard to gain to end the discounts for a straight Hereford or red hided Hereford influence feeder steer. Its time to make some hard decisions otherwise Hereford will soon be irrelevant to the commercial man once again within a few short years.






